

The Traveling 219 Project

Our next Quarterly Meeting will be presented by Gibbs Kinderman on Sunday, January 8th at 2:00 pm in the lower level of the Library in Union. Several years ago, Gibbs Kinderman was given a copy of "West Virginia, A Guide to the Mountain State, a 1941 WPA publication. These state guides were part of a New Deal federal writers' project that was launched after the Great Depression and continued until the start of WWII. The book inspired Kinderman to start the "Traveling 219 Project" which presents the history and happenings of the communities along US 219 through the mountain state. This project is supported by a web site, a Facebook Page and occasional articles, presentations and exhibits.



Gibbs Kinderman moved to West Virginia in 1966, working with a college-based program called Appalachian Volunteers. He worked for thirty-six years with the Pocahontas Communications Cooperative, helping to produce several books and CD's on local history and culture and run a non-commercial, community-oriented radio station. He also served on the Board of Education and the Library Board. A few years ago Gibbs and his wife moved to Willow Bend. Gibbs has a BA in government and a Masters in Public Administration.

Historical Society Endowment

This past year we invested \$9,500 in the Greater Greenbrier Valley Community Foundation to begin an endowment for the Society. This foundation serves Monroe, Greenbrier and Pocahontas Counties and boasts a return of 5% on invested funds. Already, our endowment exceeds \$10,000 so it is doing better than anticipated. Our goal is to grow this over the next few years so that the membership can expect appeals for this purpose. So far, our fund is based on a \$5,000 endowment from the Haskell Shumate Fund, and gifts of \$2,500 from Lawrence Caperton of London, and \$1,000 from Board Members Mary Pearl Compton and Fred & Barbara Ziegler.
